




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# Cycling in the New River Valley

In the late 90s', a handful of local cyclists teamed up to create a guidebook for cycling in the New River Valley. What they did not know is how much the guide would be used over the next 20 years. In February 2015, the New River Valley Bicycle

Association partnered with the Commission to update this valuable resource.

So how do you update a cycling guide? A local team of volunteers reviewed the existing guide by riding every mile of the 30 road rides and alternative routes. Additionally, the team reviewed route descriptions to ensure accuracy. Afterwards, the Commission digitized each route, updated cue sheets, and developed a website



(<a href="www.nrvpdc.org/cyclingguide/">www.nrvpdc.org/cyclingguide/</a>) that features an interactive experience for cyclists. Now local cyclists have the ability to search for routes by location and distance, view 3D maps with interchangeable base maps, and print cue sheets that feature turn-byturn instructions and an elevation profile.

For the cyclists that prefer riding to the very tops of our region's mountain peaks and splashing through the streams in our valley bottoms, there is an interactive map for off-road riders too. The Commission is working with local mountain bikers to digitize some of the known local favorites. While the Commission continues to finalize this section of the site, you can begin exploring the completed trail systems, swap base maps, and explore vertical elevation changes.

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# **Transportation**

The Commission is counting! Spring of 2015 the Commission purchased three infrared trail counters utilizing State Planning

and Research Funds, administered by VDOT. Knowing the average number of weekday opposed annual users is helpful for various reasons. The counters were initially purchased to help document the number of trail users throughout the region. Knowing how many people use a trail provides a link between the investment of public dollars and benefit to the community. The trail count data can also be combined with local revenue data to determine potential economic impacts of existing trails.



According to the Appalachian Trail Conservancy (AT) website, most long-distance hikers spend about \$1,000 per month. In May, about 200 hikers passed through the New River Valley each

week. Some of them may have even stopped by our AT Communities to refresh and resupply. If each hiker spent a week's worth it would have a \$50,000 per week local economic impact on the Towns' of Pearisburg and Narrows. The Appalachian Trail Conservancy website estimates that one in four hikers attempt to "thru-hike" and complete the full 2,185 miles.

Over the last year we learned a lot about the technology. For examples, if you pass one of the counters with a partner, do so in single file so that both of you will be counted! So far, the counters were set up along six trails and have recorded nearly 21,000 users. Depending on the trail, the number of users ranged from nearly 100 to more than 850 per day. Trail usage volumes easily compare to many secondary roads in the region, which can be important to consider when prioritizing transportation improvements. # August 27, 2015 Meeting Economic Development::

- The New River Valley Trail Guide for hiking and biking trails was completed in July. The guide contains the top trail assets in Giles, Montgomery, and Pulaski Counties as well as the City of Radford. Copies were distributed to all five local tourism offices.
- The Commission received notice the region was not selected for the Strengthening Economies Together (SET) program. The two regions selected were Eastern Shore and Mount Rogers. Both will be conducting a higher-level economic strategy development whereas the New River Valley application was more targeted to a specific asset, the New River.

#### Transportation:

- The Commission is under contract with the NRVMPO to conduct a Regional Transit Study. The primary purpose of the study is to identify/market key stops where more than one transit system provides service or overlaps as well as determine methods to better promote transit ridership. Currently a rider survey is open through the Fall and can be found at the project website.
- A legislative reception for the NRV Passenger Rail Project was held on August 20<sup>th</sup> at Radford University in the COBE building. The agenda included a welcome from RU President Kyle, the Commission provided an update on the study underway and Jennifer Mitchell, Director of the Department of Rail and Public Transit, provided keynote remarks.

#### Regional:

 The Commission is convening a regional discussion on tourism October 14<sup>th</sup> at 2:00pm with Ms. Rita McClenny, President/CEO of the Virginia Tourism Corporation. This will be an opportunity for Commission members to explore the tourism geography issue with the state agency leadership.

#### Commission:

- The Commission's new website www.nrvrc.org launched August 19th!
- The FY14-15 Annual Report is being designed by Allison Development Group, the same firm that developed the brand and website. The reports are scheduled to be distributed at the September Commission meeting.
- Jonnell Sanciangco, our Data Systems Manager, will be leaving the Commission in late September to return to the Philippines. Over the past two years the agency has benefitted significantly from his skills and expertise in GIS. He shared a presentation at the August Commission meeting covering several of the advancements in our technical capabilities.
- Zachary Swick was hired to fill the Data Systems Manager position and will start September 1st. He has a BA from the University of New Hampshire and a MA from Appalachian State.
- A staff strategic planning retreat was held on August 21st facilitated by Holly Lesko.

# Pulaski Adult Day Service and Fall Prevention Center

Pulaski County is hard at work on the adult daycare facility funded through the Community Development Block Grant program. The County has procured Spectrum Design to design a 4,200 square foot adult day services facility and fall prevention clinic on the site of the former Dublin Elementary School. Last spring, after construction bids for renovations at the former Newbern Elementary School came in over budget, the project reevaluated sites and chose instead to build on the Dublin Elementary site.

Since that time, the County has been working through the approval process the change in site and scope prompted from the Department of Housing and Community Development. Once the Dublin site was deemed ideal, the County held a community meeting to receive feedback from the surrounding neighborhood, met with Dublin Town Council for zoning approval, conducted a review of the environmental impacts of the site, and held several public hearings for citizen input.

Construction bids were released in mid-July and construction is slated to begin in September. The facility is designed to serve 30 elderly or disabled participants in addition to two exam rooms designated for the fall prevention clinic. The operating agency, Pulaski Adult Day Service & Fall Prevention Center, Inc., is steadily working towards a Capital Campaign goal of \$500,000 for the facility, which is projected to open for service in August 2016. # 2015 Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy

The annual update cycle for the New River Valley Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) is nearly complete. The process began last fall, when the CEDS committee met to discuss the needed updates to this year's CEDS document, and identify projects to include in next year's CEDS project list. NRVRC completed the requested updates during the spring, and the NRVRC board voted to approve the full version of the annual update to the report at their June 2015 meeting. The 2015 CEDS report is available for download on the economic development section of the NRVRC website.

The final step is the completion of the 'Consumer Version' of the CEDS for approval of the NRVRC board at the September meeting. The Consumer Version of the CEDS provides a one page summary of the latest updates on the regional economy, and more information on this year's top projects.

Some of the top projects in this year's CEDS have started development already, including work on the workforce development, entrepreneurship, tourism, and marketing efforts, which are ongoing projects at the NRVRC. Other top projects on the list will achieve major milestones this year as well, such as the start of construction on the Route 460 bypass interchange at Westgate Drive at Virginia Tech.

In Fall 2015, the NRVRC will complete the New River Valley Agriculture and Agritourism Strategic Plan, which provides recommendations on projects and strategies to support businesses in the region's agriculture sector. The NRVRC and partner organizations will then implement the strategies of the plan as possible, especially those that align with the CEDS.

In January 2016, the NRVRC will complete a preliminary study to identify opportunities to extend passenger rail service to the New River Valley, with a goal of starting service in the year 2020. More information on this project at: http://www.nrvpassengerrail.org/.
