Re: **February 2025 Financial Statements** 

The February 2025 Agencywide Revenue and Expenditure Report and Balance Sheet are enclosed for your review. Financial reports are reviewed by the Executive Committee prior to inclusion in the meeting packet.

The Agencywide Revenue and Expense report compares actual year to date receipts and expenses to the FY24-25 budget adopted by the Commission at the June 27, 2024 meeting. The financial operations of the agency are somewhat fluid and projects, added and modified throughout the year, along with the high volume of Workforce program activities, impact the adopted budget. To provide clarity, Commission and Workforce Development Board activities are separated on the agencywide report.

As of month-end February 2025 (67% of the fiscal year), Commission year to date revenues are 46% and expenses are 43% of adopted budget. The two largest budget expense lines, Salary and Fringe, are in line with budget at 61% and 68%, respectively.

Looking at the balance sheet, Accounts Receivable is \$966,055. Of this total, Workforce receivables are \$342,358 (35%) and current. The Executive Committee reviews all aged receivables over 60 days and no receivables are deemed uncollectible. Net Projects (\$363,471) represent in process projects that have not been invoiced and posted to receivables.

# 1.1 Purpose of the Environmental Impact Report

This Environmental Impact Report (EIR) assesses the environmental consequences associated with installing synthetic turf and a new video scoreboard at Radford University's (RU) softball field on the RU Central Campus in the city of Radford, Virginia. Since the cost of this state project would exceed \$500,000, the Proposed Action is classified as a "major State project." Therefore, an EIR is required under Code of Virginia §10.1-1188. This EIR was prepared in accordance with the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality's (DEQ) *Procedure Manual - Environmental Impact Review of Major State Facilities* (DEQ 2021).



The existing resource conditions in the project area (affected environment) and potential impacts of the Proposed Action are described in **Sections 3.0** and **4.0**, respectively. Additional supporting information is presented in the appendices.




Site (±1.9 acres)

**Vicinity Map** RU Softball EIR WSSI #35647.01



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# March 21, 2025 Executive Director's Report

# **Economic Development:**

- The NRV Recovery Ecosystem facilitated two input meetings this month with partner
  organizations and local government leadership in crafting the FY26 proposal to the Opioid
  Abatement Authority. There are 11 partner organizations identified to deliver services in the
  proposal with focus on expanded transportation services, implentation of peer recovery
  centers, additional prevention and treatment programming, and resources for emergency
  housing assistance.
- Broadband: The NRVRC is kicking-off the Digital Opportunities planning process to assist all
  four counties and the city in identifying strategies for residents and businesses to maximize
  the use of increased internet capacity. A regional meeting will be held later in spring with a
  wide audience to discuss strategies and formulate an action plan. Once the plan is developed
  over the next seven to eight months, communities will be able to make applications for
  implementation funds through the BEAD program.
- The Montgomery/Bland County VATI projects resumed regular construction in late February/early March after the winter weather passed. All Points Broadband in Pulaski County is working hard with AEP to get the make-ready work completed; however, AEP may need to bring on another vendor to support the workflow in order to get enough poles released to construction. All Points Broadband has submitted permits for two railroad crossings and cabinet leasing with a back-haul provider is complete.
- The Virginia AM2 Tech Hub will be featured at the Commission meeting this month. Information will be shared on the purpose of the program, progress made to date, and next steps such as a fall conference to be held in the New River Valley focused on the Tech Hub.
- The Regional Commission's role in economic development will also be featured at the meeting this month. Programs such as the Regional Economic Strategy, Revolving Loan Fund, water and sewer expansions, and technical assistance will be highlighted.

### **Transportation:**

- The Virginia Passenger Rail Authority (VPRA) groundbreaking event for the New River Valley project in Cambria was rescheduled from 3/20 to April 24<sup>th</sup> at 10:30am due to the Governor being able to attend. The NRV Passenger Rail Station Authority will not meet as a full board in March and April. The board is anticipated to the May 22<sup>nd</sup> meeting will be held as scheduled.
- Later this spring the Regional Commission will be performing a Park and Ride Lot Count and Conditions Assessment in partnership with VDOT. This activity is supported by the Rural Transportation Work Program and provides valuable information for managing the commuter infrastructure around the region. Assessment information will be shared at a future meeting of the Regional Commission.

#### Housing:

• Virginia Housing recently opened up a second round of funding for Planning District Commission (PDC) housing projects. The first round provided each PDC with funds based on

population which helped the NRV establishing the Regional Housing Fund and invest in the Claremont School and Legacy projects. The second round is a competitive program statewide with overall less funding in the program. The Regional Commission submitted a proposal that included four concept projects from around the region. The proposal did not need to have definitive projects scoped at this time due to the quick turn around. This will allow the local projects more time to define their specific program while Virginia Housing is evaluating the proposals based on potential impact of the proposals in each region.

#### **Natural Resources:**

- Following the Water Supply Planning kick-off meetings held in February, two counties submitted requests to the VA Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) to change their respective Regional Planning Unit geography. Floyd County requested to be moved into New River 1 to join Montgomery, Pulaski, Giles counties and the City of Radford. Bland County requested to be moved from New River 1 (group listed above) and into New River 2 which contains the counties of their planning district geography in Mount Rogers area. A grant to support the development of the Water Supply Plan is due to DEQ by 3/31 and will be submitted by the Regional Commission.
- The 2025 Ramps 'n Roads volunteer clean-up event for the New River along shorelines and boat launches in Giles County will take place on April 5<sup>th</sup> at 8:30am. More information is at www.renewthenew.org

### Regional:

• The Regional Commission continues to support communities impacted by Hurricane Helene. The Commonwealth recently announced two Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) opportunities for communities impacted by the storm. One program is under the Urgent Need category and has \$5.0M available for impacted communities. Several NRV communities are holding the required public hearings so they will be able to submit smaller-scale projects. The second program is part of the federal disaster appropriation which is \$47M in CDBG funds through the Disaster Recovery program. Of this amount, 80% must be spent within Washington and Giles counties due to evaluation of impacts. A public input meeting was held on 3/19 in Giles County to discuss the program and eligible projects. The Regional Commission will support Giles County in developing projects to implement the funding as well as assisting other communities in accessing the 20% not reserved for Washington and Giles counties.

### **Commission:**

• For the new office location, the architecture/engineering team is finalizing bid documents in the coming weeks that will be sent to the Town of Christiansburg for review before they can be released for the RFP process. The US Economic Development Administration has indicated an interest in funding the pre-construction portion of the project which will offset the local cost to deliver the A/E drawings. Hopefully a grant agreement will be in place soon so current/future A/E expenses can be covered by the EDA.

Re: Economic Development Administration (EDA) & Regional Support

Each year, the U.S. Economic Development Administration (EDA) provides support to the New River Valley Regional Commission (NRVRC) to advance economic development initiatives across the region. This funding enables NRVRC to facilitate long-term planning, support business growth, and pursue projects that strengthen the economic landscape of the New River Valley.

Two areas supported by EDA funding are the Regional Economic Strategy (RES) and the Revolving Loan Fund (RLF). These programs allow NRVRC to collaborate with localities, economic development organizations, and business leaders to enhance economic opportunities in the region.

### Regional Economic Strategy (RES) Update

The Regional Commission is responsible for preparing and maintaining the Regional Economic Strategy (RES), also known as the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS). This planning document informs economic development activities in the region by analyzing economic trends, setting goals and objectives, and identifying priority projects submitted by local governments.

Each year, the RES is updated with significant input from a committee of public and private sector representatives appointed by NRVRC. The Regional Commission reviews and approves the document annually, keeping it responsive to local and regional economic priorities. The RES qualifies the region for funding assistance from the U.S. Department of Commerce-Economic Development Administration (EDA), making it an important tool in securing federal resources for economic development projects. The 2024 Regional Economic Strategy is now available, including an interactive online version with dynamic data and project details.

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#### **Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) Update**

The Revolving Loan Fund (RLF) continues to be an important financing tool for local small businesses seeking capital for startup costs, expansions, and capital purchases. The program provides low-interest loans, typically ranging from \$10,000 to \$25,000, to businesses that may not have access to traditional financing. NRVRC actively seeks new applicants so that funds are utilized to support business retention and growth. Connections with RES committee members, localities, and business support organizations have helped promote the RLF program, generating interest among potential borrowers.

As of February 28, 2025, the RLF has the following balances:

Loans Receivable: \$32,886.36Restricted Cash: \$75,505.80

The RLF committee continues to market the loan program, field inquiries from businesses, and oversee loan approvals to maximize the impact of these funds in the region. ### **Additional EDA-Supported Economic Development Efforts**

Beyond the RES and RLF, EDA funding enables NRVRC to pursue strategic initiatives and respond to special requests that improve the economic development landscape in the New River Valley. This includes collaboration with regional partners, industry stakeholders, and local governments to advance economic priorities.

For example, NRVRC is working with Onward NRV on a regional industrial site development strategic planning grant, aimed at identifying and advancing shovel-ready industrial sites to attract manufacturing and technology investment. Other EDA-supported efforts include:

- The Glen Lyn Power Plant Repurposing Project, which received EDA funding for a feasibility study on redevelopment opportunities to attract new industry and investment.
- Participation in the Future of Talent Summit, convening regional leaders to discuss workforce development, recruitment, and retention strategies.
- Assisting Pulaski County with resident surveys to support a Virginia Department of Health grant application for waterline expansion in Hilton Village.
- Responding to local government data requests on labor force participation, employment trends, and workforce availability to support reporting and grant writing.

#### **Next Steps & Looking Ahead**

In the coming months, NRVRC will continue to finalize the RES, actively promote the RLF program, and pursue additional funding opportunities to support priority projects. Virginia's Additive Manufacturing and Advanced Materials (AM2) Tech Hub is a consortium of over 50 industry, higher education, local government, and support organization partners, supporting the growth and adoption of additive manufacturing and advanced materials technologies in the New River Valley-Danville region through lab-to-market commercialization, business scale-up, and talent development.

The leadership team has engaged in direct discussions with business leaders and researchers to pinpoint strategies and opportunities to align their technologies with emerging product markets. Through these discussions and quarterly meetings that incorporate lab tours and industry presentations, the Hub has cultivated a network of engaged members.

#### Leadership Team
