Re: March 2024 Financial Statements

The March 2024 Agencywide Revenue and Expenditure Report and Balance Sheet are enclosed for your review. Financial reports are reviewed by the Executive Committee prior to inclusion in the meeting packet.

The Agencywide Revenue and Expense report compares actual year to date receipts and expenses to the FY23-24 budget adopted by the Commission at the May 25, 2023 meeting. The financial operations of the agency are somewhat fluid and projects, added and modified throughout the year, along with the high volume of Workforce program activities, impact the adopted budget. To provide clarity, Commission and Workforce Development Board activities are separated on the agencywide report.

As of month-end March 2024 (75% of the fiscal year), Commission year to date revenues are 76% and expenses are 77% of adopted budget. Salary, the largest expense line, is in line with the budget at 76%. Fringe Benefits are currently 89% of the budget expense line, which is higher than budgeted due to additional health insurance enrollments.

Looking at the balance sheet, Accounts Receivable is \$910,321. Of this total, Workforce receivables are \$258,819 (28%) and current. The Executive Committee reviews all aged receivables over 60 days and no receivables are deemed uncollectible. Net Projects (\$137,405) represents project expenses, primarily benchmark projects, that cannot be invoiced yet and posted to receivables.

1. PROJECT AREA DESCRIPTION AND PLANS FOR REVITALIZATION

1.a. Target Area and Brownfields

1.a.i. Overview of Brownfields Challenges and Description of Target Area:

The Town of Dublin, Virginia proposes to conduct eligible brownfields assessment, cleanup and planning activities within the Target Area, in the Town of Dublin (2,680 pop) within Pulaski County (33,800 pop) utilizing funding from a FY2024 Multipurpose grant. The Target Area is The Dublin Industrial Park, a 271-acre site in the Dublin town limits and US census tract (CT) 51155210600, a large Census Tract covering areas within the Town of Dublin town limits and Pulaski County. Given that the town of Dublin covers only 832 acres, the subject site represents over 30% of the town's land mass. Dublin is located in southern Virginia, just north of I-81, and south of Jefferson National Forest. Roanoke is the closest city, 53.7 miles to the east.

The Dublin Industrial Park was originally part of the Radford Armory Ammunition New River Ordinance Unit during the pre-war efforts beginning in the late 1930s, and as a bag manufacturing and loading plant until 1945. The site operated as a self-sufficient facility, with its boiler house, water filtration, and sewage treatment facility. Much of the infrastructure remains from the manufacturing area of the New River Ordinance Unit. After WWII, the site was considered to be surplus property and federal ownership was relinquished. Burlington Industries purchased the property in 1947 and utilized it as a fabric processing plant where textiles were cured, dyed, and treated to produce multiple types of fabrics and materials. The town acquired the Dublin Industrial Park in 1993 through purchase of 101 acres and 1994 through donation of an addition 170 acres from Burlington Industries.

These former uses left multiple contaminants at the site, including identified asbestos-containing materials (ACMs), lead paint, lead piping, lead, copper, PCBs, and other potential contaminants including PFAS from historic fabric processing operations. In 1989, there was a release of petroleum products from underground storage tanks on the Burlington Industries property, which the Virginia DEQ oversaw the completion of the closure report in 2014 and abandonment of wells associated with monitoring the release. In addition, Burlington Industries completed ACM sampling, completed limited abatement including securing and marking the remaining asbestos insulation so that structures could be utilized for warehouse storage and logistics for area manufacturing facilities. Other permits associated with the property (wastewater permit, hazardous waste permit, air permit) have been terminated or closed.

The Dublin Industrial Park contains multiple buildings or features including: the main processing plant, the boiler house building, an abandoned kerosene oil tank, several warehouses, and an old water and sewage treatment facility with sludge requiring cleanup. A Phase I Environmental Site Assessment, conducted in July 2023 on the main processing plant and boiler house building, confirmed the presence of ACMs throughout the building. Further, the report identified the potential for PCB transformers in areas that were inaccessible during the inspection.

The Brownfield challenges presented by the Target Area's history include the multiple sites needing environmental assessment, asbestos abatement, remediation, and reuse plans due to the past industrial uses of the site. Dublin has moved away from industries like fabric processing which have been largely moved overseas, and many buildings have been left vacant with multiple issues and blight. According to the Climate and Environmental Justice Screening Tool (CEJST), the amount of low-income households is in the 61st percentile and unemployment is in the 81st percentile, which limits the tax base in Dublin. **The lack of town funds and tax revenue is an impediment to performing the assessments and abatement/remediation needed to develop an accurate cleanup and revitalization plan.** The town code limits revenue generation to specific taxes and user fees. Currently the Dublin Industrial Park generates rental income to support the Town's Enterprise Fund

PWSS Program Highlights

FOCUS ACTIVITIES:

PREVIEW Date: May 15, 2024

- Waterworks Regulations ODW will take follow-up actions following the periodic review of the Waterworks Regulations.
- **SDWIS** ODW will transition the Division of Consolidated Laboratory Services' laboratories to use the Compliance Monitoring Data Portal (CMDP) to submit compliance data electronically in compliance with the Cross-Media Electronic Reporting Rule (CROMERR). ODW has transitioned all private laboratories to CMDP.
- **Operation Fee Billing -** ODW intends to research options to replace waterworks operation fee billing software to replace an unsecure Access database, and to support changes to fee calculation methodology.
- **Policy Documents** ODW is reorganizing our policy documents from individual working memos, which typically address a single, narrow issue, into a series of manuals that compile guidance into broader subject areas. This will bring our policy documents current, make them consistent in language and format, and facilitate future updates by allowing revisions to individual chapters.
- Operation Permits ODW is emphasizing issuance of operation permits to waterworks and is updating operation permits that are out of date, to include enforceable permit conditions. ODW has implemented streamlined procedures to identify and permit existing water systems that meet the definition of a waterworks, but do not have an operation permit.
- Lead and Copper Rule Revisions and Lead and Copper Rule Improvements— ODW will implement the Lead and Copper Rule Revisions in accordance with the Primacy Extension Agreement. ODW will deliver guidance, training, and outreach to stakeholders on early implementation requirements, including Lead Service Line Inventories, consumer notification requirements for lead, galvanized requiring replacement and unknown material service lines and requirements for public notification following and action level exceedance. ODW will review service line inventory submittals and notices to consumers with lead, galvanized requiring replacement, and unknown service line materials. Following publication of the Lead and Copper Rule Improvements, ODW will draft the required amendments to the Virginia Waterworks Regulations and will complete a primacy application.

- Emerging Contaminants ODW is studying emerging contaminants in drinking water, particularly, per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) pursuant to three bills passed by the Virginia General Assembly (HB586 and HB1257 in 2020 and HB919 in 2022). These bills allow, and in some cases direct, ODW to study the occurrence of PFAS, hexavalent chromium and 1,4-dioxane in drinking water, and require the adoption of requirements for state-specific Maximum Contaminant Levels (MCLs). ODW will continue implementing Phase 3 of the PFAS occurrence study, with a goal of monitoring all community and NTNC waterworks for PFAS.
- Waterworks Operation Fee Regulation ODW is continuing a rulemaking process and will complete the administrative process to amend the regulation. ODW's intent is to ensure that fees waterworks pay more accurately reflect the benefit they receive from the drinking water program through training, operator certification, and technical and regulatory assistance.
- Sampling Verification Program ODW is implementing a new Sampling Verification Program, funded, in part, by the General Fund and includes six sampling verification positions in our six field offices and a data analyst position in the Central Office. This program provides training to ODW staff on sampling requirements and establishes policy and procedures for monitoring the water quality sampling process and water quality data. The program deploys ODW field staff to observe waterworks staff sample collection locations and procedures, collects and analyses various types of samples, and provides technical assistance and training related to sampling.
- Lead Testing in Schools and Child Care Facilities The Virginia General Assembly tasked VDH to implement a new program with an objective of further reducing lead exposure in drinking water. The program assists in implementing programs at schools and child care facilities to test for lead levels in drinking water and remediate plumbing system materials that contain lead by utilizing the 2105 and 2107 WIIN Grants. In addition, the program will reduce lead exposure in schools and child care facilities through lead service line replacement and treatment improvement projects for affiliated public water systems. This new program is funded by the General Assembly and supports three FTEs.

ORGANIZATION & OPERATIONS:

ODW is realigning the staff to meet changing business needs and processes. ODW is moving from paper-based business processes to paperless. ODW is scanning our paper files and moving them into an electronic records management system. ODW has implemented electronic sanitary survey software. We have moved from business communications via mail and hard copy to email and PDF copy. We have replaced mail notification of sample results with posting on Drinking Water Viewer. ODW transitioned all staff to laptop and tablet computers to facilitate electronic sanitary surveys and telework. Our Central Office staff continues with a hybrid schedule of 2 days per week in the office, with the balance of the time teleworking.

Grantee Environmental Competency

PREVIEW Date: May 15, 2024

A continuing environmental program (CEP) relationship exists between EPA and the Virginia Department of Health. The scope of work for the generation and use of data for 2024-2025 is similar to that in the previous CEP award. The Virginia Department of Health submitted an updated Quality Management Plan (QMP) on March 8, 2022, received comments from EPA dated December 23, 2022, on April 27, 2023, and VDH ODW senior management is considering how to address EPA's comments. The Virginia Department of Health received final approval for the initial Quality Assurance Program Plan (QAPrP) from EPA on March 1, 2024. The Virginia Department of Health generates and uses environmental data in accordance with the submitted QMP. The Virginia Department of Health has maintained its accreditation and certification requirements.

The joint evaluation process will include at a minimum **annual progress reports** by the state, including the elements of 40 CFR § 35.115. VDH will use the grant work plan as the template for reporting. EPA will meet with the state, typically planned for mid-year timeframe, to discuss progress under the grant, any obstacles, or shortcomings, and make recommendations to the state for corrective action. EPA will provide all findings in writing to the state and may require the submission of a corrective plan by the state. If resources do not allow EPA to meet with the state, e-mail and telephone discussions will take place to complete this evaluation.

ODW STAFFING

The Office of Drinking Water has 133 Full Time Equivalent (FTE) staff, plus five wage positions, allocated between the state headquarters (Central Office) and six Field Offices, as of 4/15/24. Additionally, ODW has three ARPA contractors supported by the ARPA grant. Refer to Addendum 1 – ODW Staff Roster, and Addendum 2 – ODW Organization Charts. The roster and organization charts identify the staff positions and funding sources.

May 17, 2024 Executive Director's Report

Economic Development:

- The NRV Recovery Ecosystem Program issued the first monthly newsletter earlier this week. It was distributed to all elected officials in the region, chief administrative officials for local governments, partner organizations and Regional Commission board members. Each newsletter will have dashboard data regarding participation numbers and will feature a deeper dive on a project within the overall program. It will also have quick facts on progress for each technical team. If you would like to be added to the distribution list, please contact Holly Lesko.
- Broadband: The first connections for the Montgomery/Bland project are taking place in Eastern Montgomery County area. Staff is working with all four counties and the city on making an application to the Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) Program for Digital Opportunity to develop a plan to enhance broadband use in communities.
- The NRV/Danville Tech Hub Consortium held a very successful two part meeting in April. The next quarterly meeting will also be a two part format with a webinar followed by an in-person site visit. Scheduling is underway for a July meeting focused on partners in Danville.
- The Regional Economic Strategy (RES) project list will come to the board for review at the May meeting with the full RES document presented at the June meeting.

Transportation:

VDOT held their annual public input meeting earlier this month in Salem. Several NRV representatives spoke on behalf of the passenger rail extension project and support for continued improvements on Interstate 81. The I-81 improvement program budget was recently amended to include a third lane southbound between Wildwood Road and Ironto. This was an item the Regional Commission provided a resolution of support. To keep up to date with I-81 projects please visit the website www.improve81.org

Housing:

• The Regional Housing Trust Fund is preparing to be official in July, 2024 based on local government budget adoptions taking place this spring. Non-governmental partner requests are underway. This will be the first Regional Housing Trust Fund in the Commonwealth.

Natural Resources:

• The New River Water Trail Expansion project will host a second facilitated work session in June to identify the preferred management strategy for the trail since it will incorporate multiple local governments. A planning grant will be submitted by the end of May to the Appalachian Regional Commission ARISE program for funds to plan the water trail expansion from the headwaters in North Carolina through Virginia into West Virginia.

Regional:

 Congratulations to Giles County on the recent ribbon cutting for the Giles County Trail Center located at Mountain Lake. The facility provides parking, restrooms, and a changing area for people accessing the trails and recreation assets in the area. The project was funded by the Appalachian Regional Commission by a grant made to the Friends of Southwest Virginia. The Regional Commission provided environmetrial review services and wage compliance during construction.

Commission:

- Next month Regional Commission staff will be bringing a the FY25 budget to the board for consideration. The draft budget reflects a strong revenue position with several multi-year projects along with numerous smaller projects that help advance community opportunties across the region.
- The annual staff retreat will take place on May 29th at Mountain Lake Lodge. Shelley Fortier will be facilitating. Since we have several new team members this year it will be focused on the theme, "Getting to know you and our communities." Following the retreat content, the team will be engaged in a service project in Pembroke at the Kiwanis Park in coordination with ACCE student volunteers. Activities will include indoor painting, outdoor clean-up, and technical expertise will be volunteered by NRVRC staff for a playground redesign.

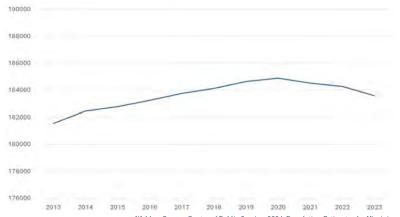

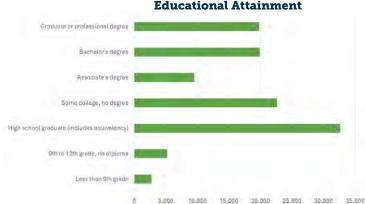

Total Population of the New River Valley 2013-2023

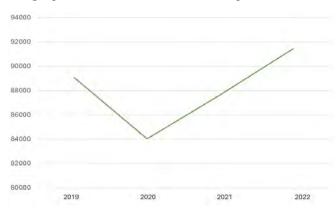

Re: Amended Budget for FY24

The board is being presented with an amended budget for FY24 due significant revenue coming into the organization since the budget was initially adopted in May 2023. Adoption of the amended budget helps the agency present more accurate financial operations and will greatly assist in the forthcoming auditing process after the FY24 year closes on June 30, 2024.

Attached to this memo are two items, an Agencywide Budget focused on expenditures, and Anticipated Revenue for FY 2023-2024. This table illustrates each revenue source and the change observed throughout the fiscal year. The first column identifies the revenue source, the second is the adopted budget from May 2024, and the third is the projected amount for FY24.

The Local Assessments, State Grants, and Federal Grants, in the first three categories remains mostly unchanged except for ARC Passenger Rail Station Development being reduced due to timing of the project, and EDA Tech Hubs being added since the proposal was awarded, now under contract, with staff hired.

Substantive adjustments are found in the Local Project Revenue category. There are several minor project adjustments attributed to projects that did not materialize this fiscal year and numerous workforce development related projects added. The projects with the highest financial impact that truly drove the need for this amendment are the broadband projects (ie-DHCD VATI 2022 at \$1.5M) with that being broken out into multiple distinct projects whereas it was lumped into one project previously, and the NRV Recovery Ecosystem labeled Montgomery County – NRV Opioid Abatement. The revenue for that project remains unchanged; however, the expense side of the budget reflects increased personnel since the proposal had 1.5 full time equivalent (FTE) positions and it resulted in four FTEs being hired.

Lastly, the amended anticipated revenue captures interest earned from the broadband matching funds held for others that is utilized in project reimbursements.

Overall, the amended budget reflects an increase of \$1,359,223 in anticipated revenue from the adopted budget with approximately \$40,000 unobligated going toward cash reserves.
