Re: September 2023 Financial Statements

The September 2023 Agencywide Revenue and Expenditure Report and Balance Sheet are enclosed for your review. Financial reports are reviewed by the Executive Committee prior to inclusion in the meeting packet.

The Agencywide Revenue and Expense report compares actual year to date receipts and expenses to the FY23-24 budget adopted by the Commission at the May 25, 2023 meeting. The financial operations of the agency are somewhat fluid and projects, added and modified throughout the year, along with the high volume of Workforce program activities, impact the adopted budget. To provide clarity, Commission and Workforce Development Board activities are separated on the agencywide report.

As of month-end September 2023 (25% of the fiscal year), Commission year to date revenues are 24% and expenses are 23% of adopted budget. The two largest budget expense lines, Salary and Fringe, are in line with budget at 23% and 27%, respectively.

Looking at the balance sheet, Accounts Receivable is \$807,805. Of this total, Workforce receivables are \$347,382 (43%) and current. Commission receivables are heavy due to closing projects to fiscal year-end. The Executive Committee reviews all aged receivables over 60 days and no receivables are deemed uncollectible. Net Projects (\$136,233) represents project expenses, primarily benchmark projects, that cannot be invoiced yet and posted to receivables.

The October 2023 Agencywide Revenue and Expenditure Report and Balance Sheet are enclosed for your review. Financial reports are reviewed by the Executive Committee prior to inclusion in the meeting packet.

The Agencywide Revenue and Expense report compares actual year to date receipts and expenses to the FY23-24 budget adopted by the Commission at the May 25, 2023 meeting. The financial operations of the agency are somewhat fluid and projects, added and modified throughout the year, along with the high volume of Workforce program activities, impact the adopted budget. To provide clarity, Commission and Workforce Development Board activities are separated on the agencywide report.

As of month-end October 2023 (33% of the fiscal year), Commission year to date revenues are 32% and expenses are 33% of adopted budget. The two largest budget expense lines, Salary and Fringe, are in line with budget at 30% and 35%, respectively.

Looking at the balance sheet, Accounts Receivable is \$854,181. Of this total, Workforce receivables are \$461,827 (54%) and current. Commission receivables are heavy due to closing projects to fiscal year-end. The Executive Committee reviews all aged receivables over 60 days and no receivables are deemed uncollectible. Net Projects (\$245,934) represents project expenses, primarily benchmark projects, that cannot be invoiced yet and posted to receivables.

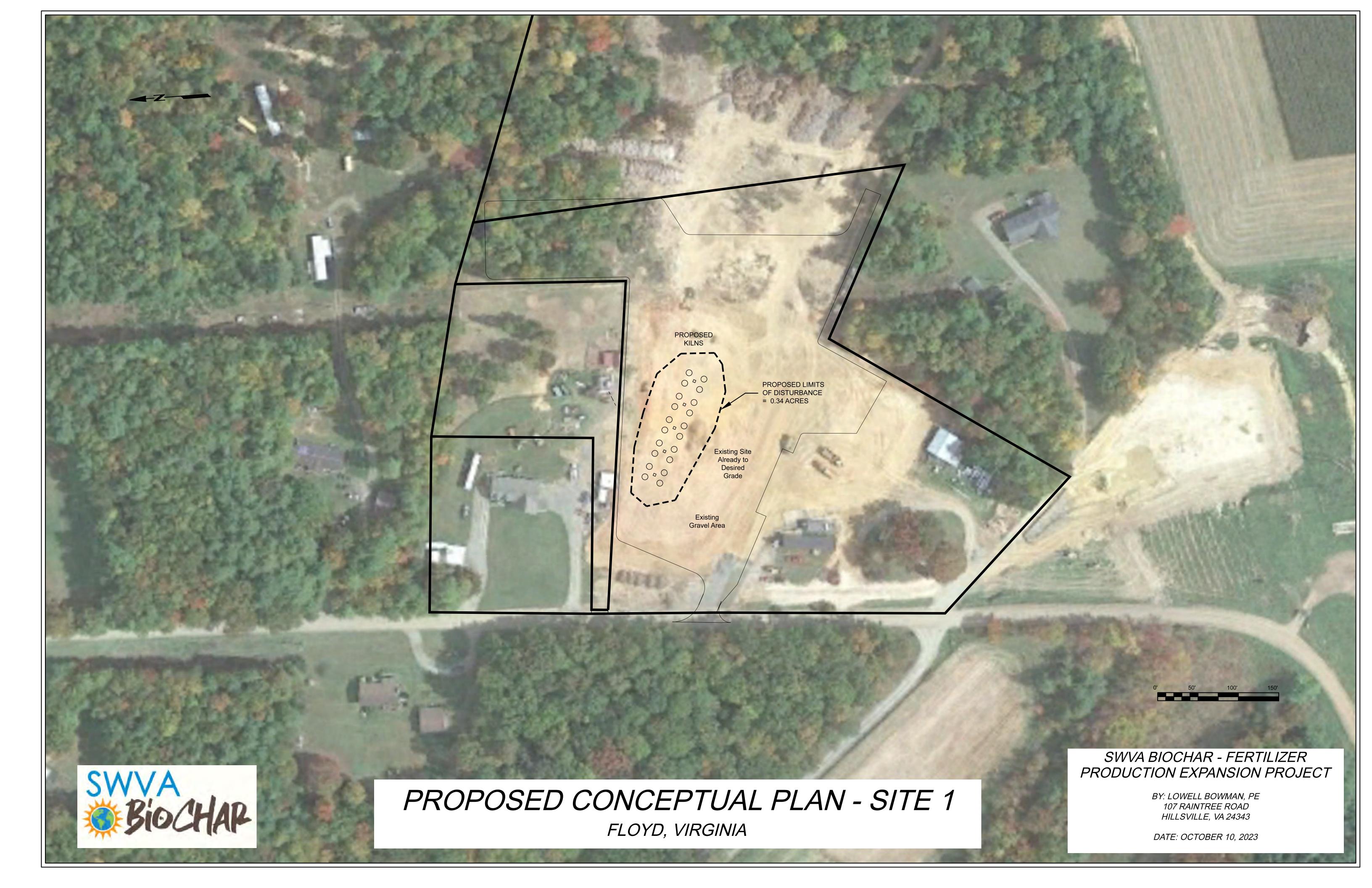

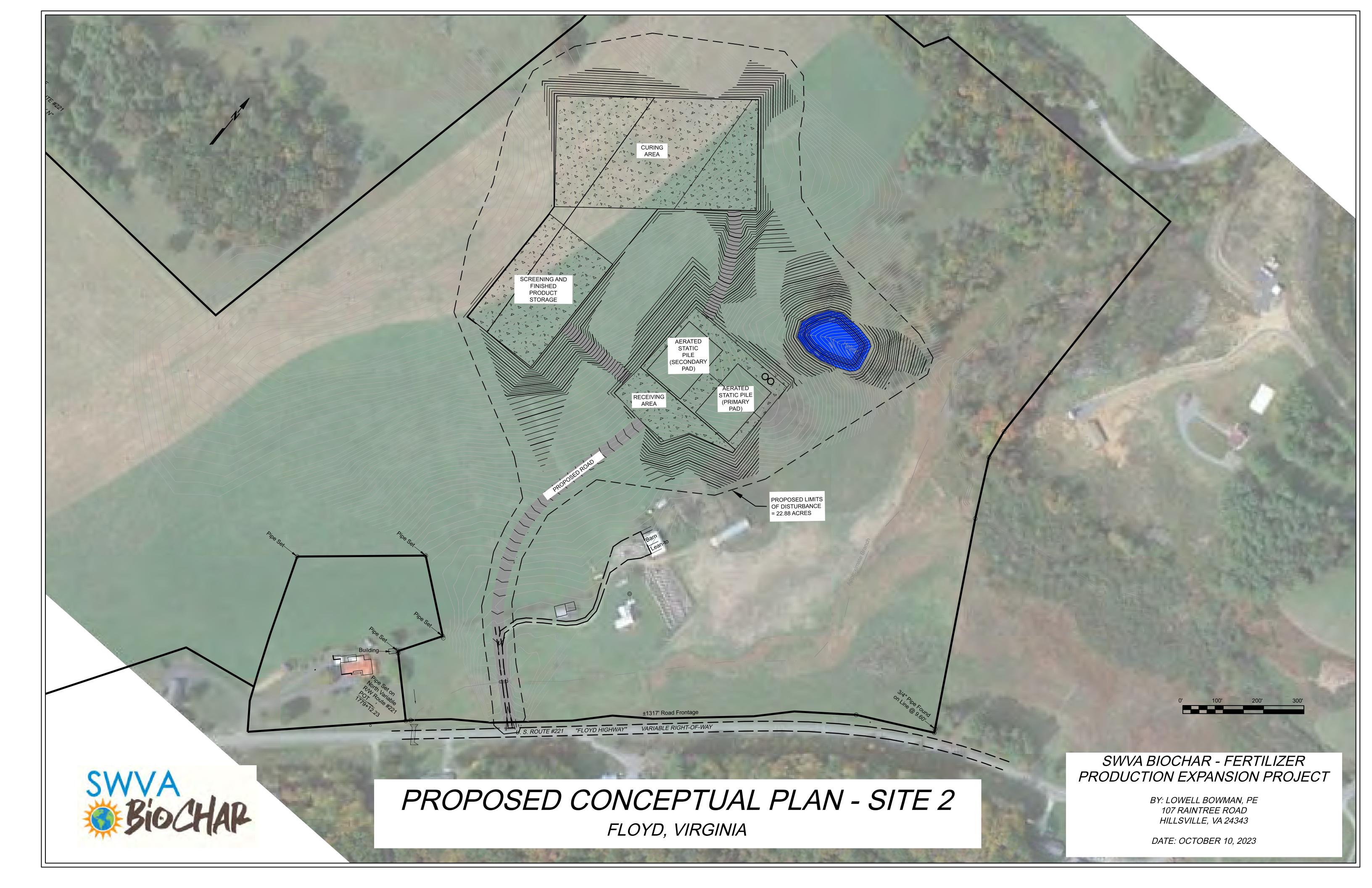

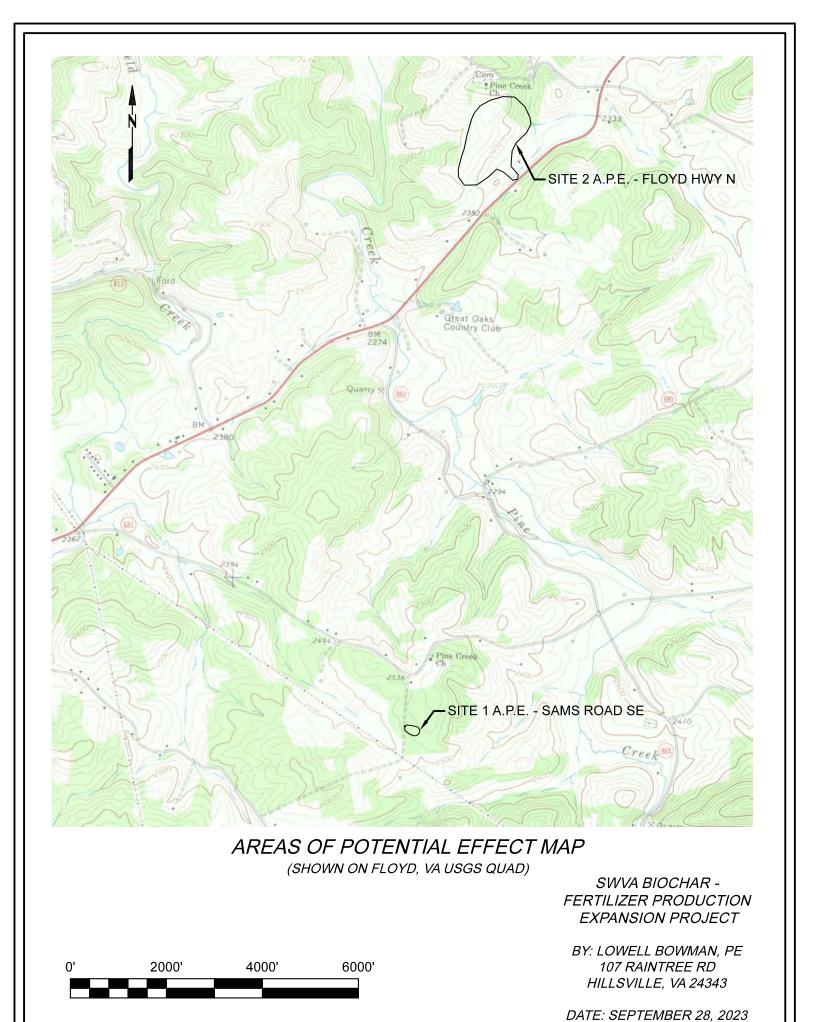

I. PROJECT IDENTIFICATION AND DESCRIPTION

1.1 Background

Virginia Tech Real Estate Management proposes to acquire a vacant lot that is adjacent to the Virginia Tech Transportation Institute complex. The property is an undeveloped lot in the commercial/industrial zoned development of the Blacksburg Industrial Park within the limits of the Town of Blacksburg, Virginia. It is a single, contiguous land parcel comprising approximately 5.33 acres. The lot is surrounded by existing developed tracts and adjoins two paved, statemaintained roads. As part of pre-purchase due diligence, Hurt & Proffit conduct a Phase I Environmental Site Assessment to identify potential environmental issues. Based on the Proponent Agency's review of state related project requirements, they determined that a Part I Environmental Impact Review (EIR) is also required for acquisition of the land.

1.2 **Project Purpose and Justification**

The purpose of the planned property acquisition is to provide a buffer from development adjacent to the Virginia Tech Transportation Institute complex. The justification for the purchase is to prevent another buyer from developing the property with construction that could impact research on the Transportation Institute's adjoining test track site due to lighting, noise or other interferences. Currently, there are no plans for development of the property; however, construction on the site may be possible within the next few years depending on funding if space for growth is needed to support the Transportation Institute.

1.3 **General Setting and Current Land Use**

The project site is located in the Town of Blacksburg, north and west of the intersection of Commerce Street and Partnership Drive. Based upon information provided within the Montgomery County, Virginia Geographic Information System (GIS), the Property is comprised of a single, distinct land parcel totaling approximately 5.33 acres. It adjoins two paved, statemaintained roads, Commerce Street and Partnership Drive. The Property is located within the Blacksburg Industrial Park within the limits of the Town of Blacksburg, Virginia, a planned commercial and industrial use area beyond which are single-family residences and wooded land. The Property is bound to the north by the Virginia Tech Transportation Institute Support Operations facility; to the west by the Virginia Tech Transportation Institute testing grounds and Institute buildings; to the south by the TORC Robotics facility; and to the east by Commerce Street beyond which is the Eastern Divide Brewery facility. Beyond these sites the surrounding land is a mix of residential developments and wooded land.

1.4 **Description of the Property and Adjacent Sites**

The property is undeveloped but has an address that is 3210 Commerce Street, Blacksburg, Virginia 24060 and is identified as Montgomery County Tax Map No. 348-A-15, Parcel ID; 220324. It has previously been graded flat to facilitate future construction in the early 2000's. Historically, it was used as pastureland for cattle farming with no documented structures present. It adjoins two paved state-maintained roads, Commerce Street and Partnership Drive and has access to utilities that include: electricity provided by American Electric Power, natural gas from Atmos Energy, water and sewer from the Town of Blacksburg and fiber/broadband provided by Comcast Business Communications. There is an active stormwater management basin along the east side adjacent to Commerce Street. The Property can be accessed where it adjoins Commerce Street and Partnership Drive. Site maps depicting the property and surrounding sites are included in Appendix A.

The Property is located within the bounds of the Blacksburg Industrial Park that is still being developed with initial construction beginning in the late 1990's. Sites adjacent to the property include:

- To the north is the Virginia Tech Transportation Institute's Support Operations facility that has a garage building for vehicle repair and maintenance and a gravel lot for parking of vehicles and equipment storage. The building was constructed in the mid-1990's beyond which is the i3 Identification International manufacturing facility.
- To the west is the Virginia Tech Transportation Institute testing grounds track comprising asphalt paved roads beyond which is the Institute buildings complex. Construction of the complex began in 1998. Beyond the facility is US Highway 460 and multiple intersections as other roads converge at the interchange.
- To the south is the TORC Robotics research and development facility that was constructed in 2014. Beyond TORC is Partnership Drive and an approximately 20 acre parcel of land that has been graded for development within the industrial park.
- To the east is Commerce Street beyond which is the Eastern Divide Brewery facility that was constructed in 2016. Beyond the brewery is mixed wooded and commercially developed land.

1.5 **Site Selection**

The site was selected based on its location adjacent to the Transportation Institute facilities and the need to prevent development that would have an adverse effect on their research and operations.

II. **PROJECT ALTERNATIVES**

The purpose of the planned property acquisition is to provide a buffer from development adjacent to the Virginia Tech Transportation Institute complex.

2.1 **Alternative Sites**

The 5.33 acre lot proposed for acquisition is adjacent to the Transportation Institute's research and testing track and their Center for Automated Vehicle Systems research building. Other parcels adjoining the test track are either owned by Virginia Tech or part of the Federal Mogul facility to the north of the site. Since the lot located at 3210 Commerce Street is adjacent to the Transportation Institute and it is the only available, undeveloped parcel, there are no other sites that could be considered as alternatives to the 3210 Commerce Street lot.

2.2 **Alternative Designs**

There are no plans for immediate development of the property; however, construction on the site may be possible within the next few years depending on funding if space for growth is needed to support the Transportation Institute.

Design considerations would be presented in a Part II Environmental Impact Review that would be submitted as a supplement to this Part I report.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This Environmental Impact Report (EIR) provides an overview of the environmental impacts associated with the proposed replacement of the Randolph Hall building with the construction of the proposed Mitchell Hall building located on the campus of Virginia Tech in Blacksburg, Virginia. The University has requested that the Perkins & Will team, which includes Dewberry Engineers Inc (Dewberry) prepare the EIR to determine the environmental impacts of the project.

The EIR provides a description of the proposed project, alternatives considered for the project, an analysis of environmental issues and mitigation measures for each alternative, and a summary of correspondence related to coordination with environmental regulatory agencies.

This EIR considers the construction of the Mitchell Hall Building. Two alternatives are considered:

- Alternative 1: A no action alternative where no construction takes place and the Virginia Tech community continues to operate with the existing Randolph Hall building.
- Alternative 2: Alternative 2 is the recommended option for the construction of the Mitchell Hall building. This option includes the demolition of Randolph Hall, the construction of Mitchell Hall, new parking area with Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) accessible parking stalls, and other associated site improvements.

Findings of the EIR indicate that Alternative 2 is a viable option for the proposed replacement of the Randolph Hall building with the construction of the Mitchell Hall Building on the campus of Virginia Tech.

1.0 PROJECT DESCRIPTION

1.1 Introduction

Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University (Virginia Tech or VT) desires to replace the existing Randolph Hall Academic Building on the Blacksburg campus of Virginia Tech with a new structure to be named Mitchell Hall.

In accordance with the Code of Virginia §10.1-1188, Virginia Tech as a state-supported institution of higher learning is required to submit an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for all major state project greater than \$500,000. This EIR is intended to address that requirement for the proposed Mitchell Hall project since the total budget exceeds \$500,000. Dewberry Engineers Inc. (Dewberry) was contracted by the project architect, Perkins & Will, to perform the Environmental Impact Review and prepare the required EIR.

To complete the EIR, standard environmental records, physical setting sources including topographic maps, geologic maps, soil maps, wetland and floodplain maps, and prior site reports were identified and reviewed. Site reconnaissance was conducted for visual inspections on throughout 2022. As of the date of this report, several agencies have not responded to the request, but the information may be received during the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality's (VDEQ) review of the EIR.

This report was prepared and formatted following the guidance provided by VDEQ's *Procedures Manual for Environmental Impact Reviews of Major State Facilities* dated June 2021 (EIR Procedures Manual) (DEQ, 2021).

1.2 Background

Randolph Hall is located on the northern portion of the Virginia Tech campus in between Hancock Hall and Lavery Hall in Blacksburg, Virginia. Randolph Hall is an academic building primarily used by the College of Engineering. **Figure 1.1** provides a vicinity map of the project's general location on the campus. Randolph Hall was constructed in two sections. The west section was completed in 1952 and the east section was added in 1959. Both sections require updating to advance the academic and research mission goals of the university's Beyond Boundaries vision plan.

A capital project request was submitted to demolish the existing building and replace it with a new and expanded facility containing the highest quality academic and research space to support the needs of students and faculty. The new facility would be called Mitchell Hall and will add more gross square feet in the same footprint that Randolph Hall currently occupies.

1.3 Proposed Facility

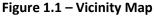
The proposed action will construct a new academic building (Mitchell Hall) on the site of the existing Randolph Hall. This site includes the demolition of Randolph Hall, an approximately 166,000 square foot (SF) of existing instructional and research building space and the construction of an approximately 284,000 SF new instructional and research building space, Mitchell Hall. The new building space will consist of 5 occupied floors and some amount of penthouse. In addition to the proposed building construction, approximately 4 acres of site development including landscape, pedestrian hardscape, vehicular paving, and new utility routes or relocations are included. With the new development, Hancock Hall which sits West of

Randolph Hall will transition into a stand-alone building. Demolition of the existing atrium roof structure will be required along with partial reconstruction of the balcony/corridor overlooking the atrium. The total disturbed area for this project will be approximately 185,000 SF. Approximately 6,000 SF of net impervious area will be removed.

1.3 Need for the Proposed Action

The Mitchell Hall building will serve as an engineering teaching and research space for faculty and students at Virginia Tech. The new facility will assist in sustaining College of Engineering enrollment, meet new building code and accessibility requirements (including sustainability features), and modernized building systems.

Figure 1.2 illustrates the location of the proposed site improvements for the Mitchell Hall building.

I. Project Identification and Description

A. Background

Virginia Tech envisions a campus that promotes health and sustainability, that advances universal design and accessibility, and that engages the community in its network of outdoor spaces. The Beyond Boundaries 2047: The Campus Plan (November 2018) presents the comprehensive vision for campus. Advancing the principles of frameworks and districts and the goals of accessibility and sustainability, The Green Links: Concept Design & Design Guidelines (March 2021) outlines an implementation plan. The project site area is located on the Virginia Tech campus in Blacksburg, Virginia, in the North Academic District. Identified as the highest priority on campus, the goal of the project is address life, health, safety, accessibility, and code compliance in the North Academic District. The scope of this project is to design and construct the Academic Greenlink Segment 3 and 4, moving between Burruss, Pamplin, and Derring Halls and the Johnston Student Center.

The new pedestrian experience shall be an organically guided one in which the landscape and the site elements create moments of repose and enjoyment. Fostering an inclusive environment for all users, the improved pathways are designed to exceed current ADA standards and be accordance with universal design principles when and where appropriate. In addition to the improved pathways, the project will provide social opportunities and destinations through creating varying scales of spaces and identifying locations for art and sculpture. The project shall be consistent with the architectural and site elements as described in the Campus Design Principles with an appropriate palette of tree, shrub, and ground cover to address grading, pedestrian patterns, wayfinding, erosion and surface stormwater runoff. The total area of land disturbance for this project is 1.90 acres. It is estimated that the project will take 6 months from the time the grading permit is issued until completion.

The anticipated project start date is Spring 2024 with the goal to complete construction by Fall 2024. The anticipated project construction cost is approximately \$1,586,616.

Project Title: Virginia Tech Greenlink Priority 2 Project

B. Proposed Facility

The outdoor public space will be designed to exceed current ADA standards when and where appropriate and in accordance with Universal Design principles. The Green Links concept uses the Appalachian landscape as an inspiration, re-imagining the experience of traversing campus as one through varied vegetation, with richness in texture, colors, and dimensions. Landscape and the site elements create moments of repose and enjoyment which provide social opportunities, Productive Collision Strategy, and destinations for rest and repose. Except where not practical nor feasible, the pathway run shall not exceed a 5% slope, and where needed accessible compliant ramps will constructed. Planting zones with the appropriate palette of tree, shrub, and groundcover to address pedestrian patterns, wayfinding, grading, erosion and surface stormwater runoff, etc. Architectural expression shall be consistent with the architectural and site elements as described in the Campus Design Principles.

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November 20, 2023 Executive Director's Report

Economic Development:

- The NRV Recovery Ecosystem Program is in the process of getting under contract with the
 Opioid Abatement Authority (OAA) and executing Operating Agreements with local partners.
 Four new employees were recently hired in order to launch the regional program. Walter
 Midkiff, Community Accountability Coordinator, and Anna Champion, Project Manager, will
 start December 1st. Kinsey Weaver, Community Accountability Coordinator, will start
 December 16th and Julie Fox, Education/Training Coordinator, will start on January 1st.
- Broadband: The bank accounts for both the Montgomery/Bland and Pulaski County projects have been set up with First Bank and Trust following an RFP process. The first project reimbursement for Montgomery/Bland took place in October. The Pulaski County project is finalizing field verification for pole attachments and anticipates their first reimbursement request in the coming weeks.
- The NRV/Danville Tech Hubs proposal for Additive Manufacturing and Advanced Materials was selected for a Strategy Development Grant by the US Economic Development Administration! This was a highly competitive national program. Collaborating with Virginia Tech's Center for Economic and Community Engagement proved to be a successful partnership in developing the consortium proposal. Approximately 200 consortia applied for designation, 31 were awarded the desination while an additional 18 regions recevied the strategy development grant. We are awaiting a contract from US EDA and will be holding a consortium kick-off meeting in the interim on 12/13. The Regional Commission will be advertising for a Regional Innovation Officer position to support this project in the coming weeks.
- A GO Virginia grant request for their capacity building program that dovetails with the Tech
 Hub program was recently recommended for approval by the GO VA Region 2 Regional
 Council. The state board for GO VA is scheduled to take action on the proposal in December.

Transportation:

• The NRV Passenger Rail Station Authority will meet on December 15th at 11:30am. The Virginia Passenger Rail Authority staff will be discussing upcoming public engagement focused on the required environmental review process. The nominating committee will also present a slate of officers for 2024.

Natural Resources:

• The Plant Soutwest Virginia Natives program recently completed the Native Plant Guide for the region. Guides were shipped to the Regional Commission office and our team has been delivering boxes of the guides to government offices, libraries, partner organizations, and businesses across the region. If you are interested in receiving copies, please contact Aphi Fanconb (afancon@nrvrc.org) or Kathleen Armstrong (karmstrong@nrvrc.org).

Regional:

• The NRV Housing Trust Fund (HTF) made their first investment of \$1.8M and selected projects in Pulaski and Blacksburg that represents 106 units of affordable housing being added to the regional inventory. The Pulaski project is a conversion of the Claremont School, a former elementary school, and the Blacksburg project is new construction on South Main Street.

Commission:

- Thanks to Pulaski County and Volvo for hosting a terrific annual dinner event in October. It was a great turnout and an impressive venue. A press release celebrating the award recipients ran in numerous local media outlets promptly after the event.
- Leo Priddy was hired in October to fill the Economic Development Specialist role. Leo has experience working with the Montgomery County Chamber of Commerce and the Small Business Development Center serving as the New River Valley advisor. He has hit the ground running getting the Regional Economic Strategy committee membership updated along with the Revolving Loan Fund committee. Both will meet in December.
- Hats off to both Kathleen Armstrong and Leo Priddy for being nominated as Community Service Individual of the Year by the Montgomery County Chamber of Commerce! Award winners will be announced on December 7th at the Chamber Annual Meeting.
- Staffing of the Regional Commission is going through the planned expansion that was included in the FY24 budget. Four people were hired to support the NRV Recovery Ecosystem, interviews are underway for an additional Finance Technician, and a Regional Innovation Officer will be advertised soon to support the Tech Hubs program. The organization will be at 22 employees in the next month or so, the largest to date. In order to accommodate the growth, seven existing staff members have moved work stations/offices and three areas in our leased space have three to five employees sharing space. Everyone's willingness to accommodate the growth and change has been greatly appreciated.

Re: Roanoke-Blacksburg Regional Airport

At the November Regional Commission meeting the Roanoke-Blacksburg Regional Airport (ROA) Executive Director, Mike Stewart, will speak to air service opportunities and how making the business case for the region is top of mind in discussions with the airlines. He will also highlight opportunities for growth included in the Airport Master Plan that was submitted to the FAA this summer for approval.

The Roanoke-Blacksburg Regional Airport (ROA) offers nonstop service to eight destinations, including Atlanta, Charlotte, Chicago, New York City (LaGuardia), Orlando-Sanford, Philadelphia, St. Pete/Clearwater, and Washington, D.C. (Dulles) on four airlines – Allegiant Air, American, Delta, and United. On average, ROA sees 16-19 daily departures depending on the day of the week. In 2022, over 300,000 passengers departed from ROA, with 2023 passenger levels expected to exceed these numbers.

Re: FY25 Per Capita Assessment Rate (Commission Dues)

Each year the New River Valley Regional Commission sets the per capita assessment rate that is charged to members of the Commission. The per capita assessment serves as the financial foundation of the agency. This funding is critical to the agency and is typically leveraged at a rate of 10:1. The assessment foundation helps generate an overall budget of approximately \$3.4 million for the agency which is reflected by services returned to members of the Commission.

The current FY24 assessment rate is \$1.32 per capita based on Census 2020 data. In the past, the Commission has used the annual population estimates from the Weldon Cooper Center since it provides for minor adjustments rather than more drastic adjustments with a decennial census. With the release of the 2020 Census data in 2021, the FY23 and FY24 assessments utilized those figures. The Executive Committee is recommending a return to using the Weldon Cooper Center population estimates for FY25 while keeping with the existing rate of \$1.32. The Commission typically adjusts the rate every two years, and this would be the third year of a level rate, although moving back to using Weldon Cooper data. The table includes a comparison of rate increases of two, three, and four cents for discussion purposes.

The per capita assessment as proposed for FY25 with Weldon Cooper data generates \$241,429.32 (a net increase of \$3,208.92 over the Census data) for the Commission to use as matching funds for programs. The programs that require match are VDOT's rural transportation planning (\$14,500), Economic Development Administration -Economic Development District (\$70,000), Appalachian Regional Commission (\$68,000), Ride Solutions (carpool matching program) (\$20,080), Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan (\$18,000), New River Watershed Roundtable DEQ grant (\$4,000) and to support projects that arise during the year. The per capita assessment is considered unrestricted funds and allows the Commission to provide match for the programs identified above, support office operations, as well as technology and training needs of staff, and creates the opportunity for new programs in the region if all unrestricted funds are not programmed.

The attached table illustrates the assessment rate for FY25 comparing the Census 2020 and Weldon Cooper population figures by member along with a column for change in dues amount. It is important to note; the Commission removes town populations from the counties. Also, university membership is calculated based on the on-campus residents and their population is removed from the host locality. New River Community College is assessed based on their enrolled students who reside outside of the region. This approach avoids a double assessment for town residents as well as student populations.

Re: NRVRC Regional Economic Strategy - New Committee Members Appointment

Each year the New River Valley Regional Commission reviews and updates the region's Regional Economic Strategy (RES). The purpose of the RES is to continue federal and local partnerships to address economic development in the region. The RES also serves to document the planning efforts to identify economic development needs in the region, which is required for grant applications to the US Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration (EDA), the Appalachian Regional Commission, and various other state and regional grant-making agencies.

The Commission's designation by the EDA as an Economic Development District (EDD) includes a requirement to engage a committee of regional representatives from public and private sector organizations and businesses in the development of the strategic document. The committee reviews content, strategies and assists in developing updates.

Since the Commission's original appointment of RES committee members, there has been some turnover in appointments. Staff is now recommending five (5) appointments that will provide their expertise on regional economic development issues. Additionally, you will note an open slot for the Town of Blacksburg, as an invitation will be extended to their future Deputy Town Manager. These recommended members are highlighted below in red.
