



Executive Summary

The purpose of the Montgomery County Parks and Recreation Master Plan is to provide a vision for the Montgomery County Parks and Recreation Department for the next 20 years as well as insights into how the Department can accomplish this vision. This Plan will provide recommendations that focus future growth in areas where Montgomery County Parks and Recreation already excels or where services provided by the Blacksburg and Christiansburg Parks and Recreation Departments are not already meeting the need.

As the most populated county west of Charlottesville, Montgomery County has unique attributes, including being home to a major university (Virginia Tech) and two of the largest towns in the Commonwealth (Blacksburg and Christiansburg). Population projections predict the County will experience 35 percent growth by 2040.

With the input of the Montgomery County Parks and Recreation (MCPR) Commission and staff, the following mission statement was created for Montgomery County Parks and Recreation:

“To improve and promote a better quality of life by providing safe and positive recreational programs, facilities and opportunities for all citizens of Montgomery County.”

The population in Montgomery County is projected to increase almost 35% by 2040.

As part of the process to develop a Parks and Recreation Master Plan for Montgomery County, existing facilities and programs were inventoried and assessed. A citizen survey was also distributed to garner feedback from residents and users. Finally, local, state and national trends were taken into consideration, helping to ensure the relevance of each recommendation. County population and demographics, overall trends and previous examples of other parks and recreation master plans locally and nationally were all important factors taken into consideration.

Many of the recommendations within this Plan were derived directly from citizen input given through the recreation survey. The survey, which ran from August through October of 2015, gauged citizen use and satisfaction of each of the Department's programs and facilities, as well as existing and future needs. The County received a total of 358 survey responses, with the towns of Blacksburg and Christiansburg and the village of Riner having the largest representation. Many respondents praised the MCPR staff for its programs, specifically pointing out youth athletics, outdoor recreation and active adults.

Prior to the development of any recommendations, each of the County's parks and recreational assets were inventoried and reviewed. MCPR owns or maintains nine parks and trails and maintains several others that it uses in partnership with Montgomery County Public Schools. These nine parks and trails include:

- Old Shawsville Elementary School
- Coal Mining Heritage Park and Loop Trail
- Eastern Montgomery Park and Nature Trail
- Huckleberry Trail
- McCoy Park
- Motor Mile Park
- Mid-County Park, along with the Frog Pond Swimming Pool and Golden Hills Disc Golf Course and Nature Trail
- Plum Creek Park
- Whitethorne River Park Boat Launch (owned by DGIF)

The Department also runs recreation programs and events such as athletics, aquatics, tours, active adults, community programs and outdoor recreation. Outside of these programs, MCPR maintains regular and special events each year and partners with Montgomery County Public Schools, each of the Town's parks and recreation departments, Radford University, and Virginia Tech to provide even more recreational opportunities. Volunteers play a key role in filling coaching and park maintenance roles within the Department.

MCPR manages these facilities and programs with a staff of nine full-time employees and three part-time, year-round employees. Funding for the Department is provided through direct revenue from its programs and entry fees and from the County General Fund. The Parks and Recreation budget is around \$830,000 annually, which represents approximately two percent of the County's General Fund.

With the population of Montgomery County expected to exceed 127,000 by 2040, a growing and active population will increase the demand on current MCPR facilities, programs and staff. The County's Comprehensive Plan anticipates the expanding population will locate fairly evenly between the towns of Blacksburg and Christiansburg as well as the unincorporated county. It should be noted that the 30,000 students at Virginia Tech are included in this population count. Virginia Tech provides recreation activities on campus, so this population is therefore much less likely to participate in locality-sponsored parks and recreation.

With guidance from MCPR staff and the Parks and Recreation Commission, public input and the data gathered were analyzed to help develop the final Master Plan recommendations and benchmarks to evaluate progress. Special attention was paid to encouraging development in programs in which the County already excels or in new programs or facilities that would provide extra value or fill an unmet need.

The Master Plan addresses a broad scope of recommendations, allowing the County to work toward these action items over the next 20 years. Representing its most immediate goals, the Department has identified the following recommendations as its top six short-term priorities toward implementing the Master Plan over the next five years:

- Acquire property adjacent to the New River to create an outdoor river park
- Implement an equipment replacement plan
- Implement ADA improvements to current parks
- Acquire long-term lease for land to expand Old Shawsville Elementary site
- Expand athletics to include adult athletics
- Pursue the feasibility of a recreation center



Chapter 1: Mission and Goals

Both the mission statement and goals of MCPR were created to provide a framework for the future of the Department. These were created as a result of meetings between the MCPR Commission and staff in early 2015. They were presented to and accepted by staff and the Parks and Recreation Commission in June 2015.



MISSION

The Montgomery County Parks and Recreation staff and Advisory Commission created the following mission statement for the Department: **“to improve and promote a better quality of life by providing safe and positive recreational programs, facilities and opportunities for all citizens of Montgomery County.”**

This mission statement is meant to address all users, regardless of age, race, gender or socio-economic status and address the services the Department provides for the community, either currently or in the future.

GOALS

The goals below were developed with the input of MCPR staff and Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission in 2015. For a full list of the Department's goals and objectives, please see Appendix A.

The goals were broken into three sections:

- Parks, Trails and Facilities;
- Programs, Events and Partnerships;
- Department Operations, Outreach and Marketing.



Chapter 2: Existing Conditions

Montgomery County is growing in age, population and density, and these trends will have a significant impact on recreation. As of 2014, Montgomery County Parks and Recreation serves the 31,454 residents within the unincorporated area of the County. In addition, the 65,790 residents who live within the towns of Blacksburg and Christiansburg also have access to MCPR parks, facilities and programs, for a total of 97,244 citizens. This number is predicted to grow to over 127,000 by 2040, an increase of nearly 35 percent.



Population and Demographics

Montgomery County, located in the New River Valley region of southwest Virginia, is a growing community. In 2014 the County's total population was 97,244, an increase of three percent from 2010. The two Towns within the County, Blacksburg and Christiansburg, have robust town governments and individual parks and recreation departments. The majority of the population of the County lives within these towns (see Figure 2.2). Virginia Tech's student population accounts for over 56 percent of the Town of Blacksburg's population. It should be noted that since recreational activities are provided on campus, the student population represents approximately 30,000 residents who are unlikely to participate in locality-sponsored parks and recreation programs.

The County is 387.1 square miles, with 243.9 persons per square mile as of the 2010 Census. The state average is 202.6 persons per square mile.

Housing units and households are also increasing. In 2014 there were 39,217 housing units, compared to 38,569 housing units in 2010. From 2009-2013 there were 34,789 households, with an average of 2.44 persons per household, compared to 2.6 persons per household for the state. The median household income in the County is \$45,543 and the average for the Commonwealth is \$63,907.

AND POPULATION DENSITY





FIGURE 2.3

Future Demographic Projections

Beginning with 2010 census data, the County’s population is projected to increase by almost 35 percent, or 32,946 people by 2040. It is estimated that this growth will be distributed evenly between the towns of Blacksburg and Christiansburg and the unincorporated County. Figure 2.3 illustrates the relative growth for each locality.

With increased population comes additional pressure on the facilities and programs MCPR currently operates as well as additional demand for new or expanded programs and resources.

This Plan will focus future growth in areas where Montgomery County Parks and Recreation already excels or where services provided by the Blacksburg and Christiansburg parks and recreation departments are not already meeting the need.

Trends

NATIONAL AND STATE

In addition to the traditional roles performed by parks and recreation departments, national trends reported by the National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA) show that parks and recreation department responsibilities are also expanding to perform non-park management, such as organizing and leading educational programs, vocational training and environmental management.

Operationally, capital improvement needs are at an all-time high. Agencies are diversifying into more fee-based programs to secure funds for these improvements. Parks and recreation departments that create or manage tourism-generating facilities have a tremendous opportunity to expand revenues and services.

The 2013 Virginia Outdoors Plan conducted a survey and held public meetings to identify priorities for the New River Valley:

1. Creating bikeable/walkable communities, learning opportunities and developing land in a way that promotes public health
2. Using technology, learning opportunities and partnerships to expand youth recreational opportunities
3. Continuing to develop trails
4. Developing more water access points
5. Protecting key viewsheds through land conservation

REGIONAL TRENDS

Recreation was addressed by the New River Valley Livability Initiative, completed in 2014. This three-year planning process identified four theme areas with associated goals and strategies for the region. These four themes and the relationship they have with recreation are detailed below.

1. *Enhancing Living and Working Environments*
 - a. The region is aging. This means a diminishing workforce and tax base to provide services. Outdoor recreation is a key quality of life element that plays a large role in attracting and retaining new businesses and employees.
2. *Preserving Rural Heritage and Community Character*
 - a. Areas conserved for recreational use will provide recreational and tourism opportunities far into the future. Long-term, localities with fewer conserved lands may struggle to serve the recreational needs of their citizens.
3. *Making the Business Environment More Productive and Resilient*

The role of parks and recreation departments is expanding to non-traditional activities.

The changing recreation preferences of aging adults will have an impact on parks and recreation.

a. Recreation is playing an increasingly larger role in a locality's economic development viability. As a top quality of life feature, it is common for businesses to locate in areas that offer quality recreational opportunities.

4. Building Healthy Communities


a. While housing density in the region is expected to increase, most homes will be further than a quarter of a mile from the nearest recreational opportunity. Increasing access to these opportunities through trails, sidewalks and bike lanes will provide new recreational opportunities and increase community health.

MONTGOMERY COUNTY

Recreation priorities, goals and land use policies were identified in the 2004 Montgomery County Comprehensive Plan, which includes directives to expand services, diversify park and recreational offerings and increase regional cooperation and collaboration.

Since two-thirds of the County's growth by 2040 is projected to occur within the towns of Blacksburg and Christiansburg, the remaining one-third of future population growth will occur within the unincorporated areas of the County. The County has identified, through its Village Plans, the areas in which to promote development. These seven villages include: Belview, Elliston, Lafayette, Plum Creek, Prices Fork, Riner and Shawsville (see Figure 2.4).

Facilities and Programs Offered

Residents of Montgomery County have many opportunities for recreation. Table 2.2 shows facilities offered by each of the recreation departments in Montgomery County, but does not include privately operated facilities. Facilities such as football fields, indoor basketball courts, and baseball fields made available to the parks and recreation departments by Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS) are included. The joint use of MCPS facilities represents a beneficial partnership for each of the departments.

Table 2.3 below illustrates the number of Montgomery County citizens per recreational facility. The National Recreation and Park Association collects this data nationally, which is derived by dividing the population of a locality by the number of a certain type of facilities. By this measurement, having fewer persons per playground signifies that a locality has multiple playgrounds to serve its residents. The final column indicates whether the facilities offered by each of the parks and recreation departments fall above, below or on par with the national average. Some facilities are more appropriate to the area than others, and MCPR can use this table to aid in evaluating future facility expansion.

Table 2.4 illustrates the programs currently being offered by each of the parks and recreation departments in Montgomery County. The column marked "National" represents the percentage of parks and recreation departments across the country who also provide the program.

While most programs are being offered by at least one locality, this chart shows several opportunities for program expansion, specifically environmental programs (which could be incorporated into existing outdoor recreation programming), tennis (which was identified in the recreation survey) and community gardens.

Two additional programs that over a third of parks and recreation departments offer are before- and after-school programs and preschool. This demonstrates the diversification of services into non-traditional roles that many departments are moving toward.



To better understand the programs offered in the County, Figure 2.5 illustrates the concentration of programs offered per recreational facility. Higher concentrations of programs are depicted in red and purple, and buffers represent a three-mile radius. With the exception of Belview, MCPR has programs located in each of its villages.

MCPR currently employs nine full-time employees. Fractional numbers in Table 2.5 below represent full-time employees who may have multiple roles split over several program areas. It should be noted that both towns operate recreation centers and aquatic centers, which require more staffing. As the County's population grows and MCPR expands existing programs or adds additional ones, the County will need to consider expanding staffing to meet the needs and desires of residents.



Funding

The Department's annual budget is comprised of the General Fund and revenue generated by its programs and entry fees. Currently the Department seeks little to no annual funding through fundraising or grants.

From 2011 to 2015, MCPR's budget comprised two percent of the County's General Fund. This represents approximately \$830,000 annually.

FUND



Revenue

Revenue is the amount of money generated as a result of fees paid for programs, classes, entry fees and concessions. Revenue can also be used as a performance measure for a department. As illustrated in Table 2.6 below, even through the recession, revenues for MCPR have fared well, averaging \$166,153 from 2010 to 2014. Table 2.8 on page 16 illustrates how these revenues equate per capita.

Historically, entry and program fees have comprised 80 percent of revenue for most parks and recreation departments. However, within the past few years, facility entry fees have decreased, with departments diversifying toward multiple sources of revenue. Table 2.7 shows a comparison between the sources of direct revenue nationally and those of MCPR.

Table 2.8 reflects direct revenue generated by parks and recreation departments within Montgomery County from non-general fund sources. Departments who operate or rent out facilities (such as recreation centers, aquatic centers, pools, etc.) have a greater opportunity for fee-based revenue. MCPR generates the majority of its revenue from youth athletics, Frog Pond admissions and other community programs.

MCPR falls below the national average of \$11.08 per capita in revenues, which presents an opportunity for the Department to assess other sources of revenue or consider incremental increases in current fees.

Currently, 17 percent of MCPR's overall budget comes from revenues, compared to 22.9 percent and 33.5 percent for the towns of Christiansburg and Blacksburg respectively (see Table 2.9). As mentioned regarding Table 2.8, higher revenue rates for the two towns are probably attributed to the recreation and aquatic centers each town operates and reflects the dynamic of three parks and recreation departments within one county. However there are many opportunities MCPR can explore for diversifying and increasing its revenue while providing unique recreational programs and facilities for residents.

Cost Recovery

Cost recovery is a measure for how much revenue a parks and recreation department generates compared to its operating costs. Total operating costs in FY14 were approximately \$920,643. In 2014, MCPR recovered 17.8% of operating costs primarily through program and facility entry fees. Nationally, similarly sized parks and recreation departments have a cost recovery of 26.7%.



Chapter 3: Recreation Survey

The Montgomery County Parks and Recreation Department developed a survey for Montgomery County citizens which was available both online and in hard copy. The survey was promoted on MCPR's social media platforms, printed signs were also placed around the County and at athletic events. Citizens were asked to evaluate the Department in several key areas: athletic facilities, parks and recreational facilities, programs, events, capital improvements and marketing and outreach. Respondents were also asked about their participation level, satisfaction and future recreational needs.

Trends in survey responses were incorporated into the recommendations found in this Plan. A copy of the survey and full survey results can be found in Appendix C and D.

Survey Demographics

The County received 358 responses to the survey, with 23 percent of respondents reporting to be from Christiansburg, 21 percent from Blacksburg, 15 percent from Riner, nine percent from Elliston, seven percent from Shawsville, two percent from other parts of Montgomery County, 11 percent from outside Montgomery County and 12 percent who did not answer.

RESPONDENTS PLACE OF RESIDENCE





FIGURE 3.2

Facilities, Programs, and Events

Survey respondents reported that, of the athletic and parks and recreational facilities, most frequented the Huckleberry Trail and the Frog Pond. Fewer people use Plum Creek Park, Golden Hills Golf Course and McCoy Park. Overall, respondents claimed to have used one or more MCPR facilities 1-20 times within the past year.

Most respondents reported participating in youth athletics and outdoor recreation activities. Fewer people participated in the active adult (50+) activities. Overall, respondents claimed to have participated at least 1-5 times in one or more MCPR programs within the past year. Most citizens claimed to have attended Montgomery County Heritage Day and the Sandlot Nights.

Most respondents were satisfied with the facilities and programs from MCPR.

Citizen Satisfaction

Most respondents were satisfied or very satisfied with the athletic facilities, parks and programs that MCPR offered, but were interested in the County offering more.

Future Growth

Respondents reported interest in a recreation center, more baseball fields, an outdoor recreation/river park, new or improved neighborhood trails, an amphitheater, more playgrounds and a splash pad.

The majority of respondents expressed interest in more outdoor recreation programs, youth athletics, exercise classes and adult athletic programs. In regard to events, many expressed interest in more music-related events or a concert series.

Capital Improvement Projects

Respondents were asked to choose one major capital improvement or facility that the County should begin to prioritize as a long-term goal. The three highest ranked responses were equally rated and included a sports complex, a community center/gym and an outdoor river park with camping facilities. Respondents reported they would be willing to travel an average of 25 minutes to this new facility, which is approximately a 10-15 mile drive. The majority of the respondents said they would pay for this facility through donations, user fees or a bond.

Department Outreach

Montgomery County citizens are keeping in touch with MCPR. Respondents were asked to choose which sources of communication they used to connect to MCPR and each choice received high response rates. MCPR currently handles outreach through social media, printed brochures, the County website, email and word of mouth.

Chapter 4: Analysis and Recommendations

This section inventories the facilities, programming, and departmental structure of the Montgomery County Parks and Recreation Department to evaluate existing conditions and provide recommendations for MCPR. Recommendations within this section were based on the following:

1. feedback from the recreation survey,
2. priorities identified by the MCPR Commission, staff and County administration,
3. local, state, and national trends in parks and recreation

Parks and Facilities

The Montgomery County Parks and Recreation (MCPR) Department owns or operates five parks, three of which have walking trails; a disc golf course; a boat launch; athletic fields at the former Shawsville Elementary school; a section of a regional trail and Montgomery County’s only public outdoor swimming pool. Additionally, the County maintains a relationship with Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS) to use several of its facilities for athletic programs.

Overall, Montgomery County citizens are satisfied with the parks and facilities offered in the County. However, this Plan will focus on some of the areas in which MCPR can better serve County residents, strengthen the areas in which it already provides a unique service and anticipate future needs. When assessing its parks and facilities, MCPR should focus on: *connectivity, accessibility and wayfinding*.

Connectivity: Connecting parks and recreation facilities to the greater community is a challenge in large geographic areas like Montgomery County and requires resources and coordination beyond what exists in any single department. However, the County can focus efforts of connectivity in the villages and to the towns in order to serve the largest number of citizens.

Accessibility: After assessing each park and facility MCPR owns or uses, the need for several accessibility modifications was identified. The County has selected accessibility as a high priority for each of its parks.

Wayfinding: While each of MCPR's parks and facilities have signs, most do not have a map of the park or any orienting signage for wayfinding. Adding this kind of signage would increase the usability of each facility and help orient users.

Eastern Montgomery Park

Eastern Montgomery Park is located off of Route 11 in Elliston. With over 10 acres, the park includes a playground, benches, a nature trail, a large picnic shelter with electricity, two public grills, restroom access and designated parking. Currently, the large field adjacent to the park is home to the Montgomery County Model Airplane Club. The site also offers access to the Pug Wells Nature Trail, which links the park to the South Fork of the Roanoke River blueway and a canoe and kayak boat launch.

Huckleberry Trail and Coal Mining Heritage Park/Loop Trail

The Huckleberry Trail is a 12-mile regional trail that connects the County, Town of Christiansburg, Town of Blacksburg and the Jefferson National Forest. This regional asset gives MCPR many opportunities to link the greater community to other MCPR facilities. The County owns and maintains the portion of the trail not located in either of the towns, about two miles in length, including trail signage, a parking lot and a spur that connects the Huckleberry Trail to the Coal Mining Heritage Park/Loop Trail.

The Coal Mining Heritage Park/Loop Trail is a biking/hiking historical trail straddling the Huckleberry Trail. It is approximately 30 acres and includes informational signage highlighting the coal mining history of this area. Users can access this park from the Huckleberry Trail or by parking at a lot off of Merrimac Road.

McCoy Park

McCoy Park is a five-acre park located on McCoy Road next to the McCoy fire station. It is the only park owned and operated by MCPR within the McCoy and Prices Fork area of the County. The park includes a baseball/softball diamond, spectator seating, storage facilities, a shelter with picnic tables, communal grill, a walking trail, lighting, a playground and a parking area. The park's location next to the fire station increases safety around the park and reduces vandalism.

MID-COUNTY PARK

At 110 acres, Mid-County is the largest park operated by Montgomery County Parks and Recreation. Mid-County Park includes the Activities Center, the Frog Pond Swimming Pool, Golden Hills Disc Golf Course, a playground, hiking trails and picnic shelters. A two-mile nature trail system connects these facilities. Other features at Mid-County include two picnic pavilions with public grills, restrooms, a playground with benches and a basketball court. Parking is provided in front of the Activities Center and Frog Pond Swimming Pool.

Being the largest asset within the Department, MCPR may need to investigate providing additional access to Mid-County by public transit or a greater trail network. With the Huckleberry Trail just over a mile away, and with a pedestrian bridge already in place over Highway 460, a path connecting the Mid-County to the Huckleberry Trail should be explored.

Activities Center

The Activities Center is a two-level building which includes a large television and audio-visual equipment, refrigerator, wash basin, microwave, storage for tables and chairs and restroom facilities.

Many County schools use the facility when visiting the Frog Pond during field trips. Currently, MCPR does not rent this building out to the general public.

Frog Pond Swimming Pool

The Frog Pond swimming pool is the only public outdoor swimming pool within the County and features a 128,000 gallon swimming pool, four slides, a water drop, sprays and covered picnic areas. The pool is well maintained, with a regular maintenance schedule. There is a designated children’s pool, concessions for pool patrons (contracted out to third-party vendors) and the facility can accommodate up to 100 persons. There are drinking fountains, public and employee restrooms and an office. Parking is located in front of the building with overflow space if needed. The site is handicap accessible.

Golden Hills Disc Golf Course

Golden Hills Disc Golf Course, the only 37-hole disc golf course in the region, is located within Mid-County Park. This is a popular area for college-age users and has quick access to the Frog Pond and other facilities of Mid-County Park. The course is free to play and includes benches, trails, picnic shelters and a parking lot. The course is mostly wooded, with hilly terrain that has caused some erosion issues on and around the course. Lack of visibility into the picnic shelter from the parking lot has created safety concerns. In addition, the grade of the path down to the shelter is too steep to be handicap accessible.

Motor Mile Park

Motor Mile Park is located off State Road 177 on the site of the former Bethel Elementary School. The site is just over five acres and includes a baseball/softball diamond, dugouts, batting cages, spectator seating, lighting, restrooms, storage, a soccer field, picnic shelter, public grill, a playground and a gravel parking lot. Currently, there are few residences around the park, so connectivity to the park is limited.

Old Shawsville Elementary School

MCPR recently acquired the former Shawsville Elementary School property in Elliston, which it uses extensively for athletics. Currently, the site has two baseball/softball fields, batting cages, an informal soccer field and portable restrooms. The former school building was recently torn down, and the Department has future plans of expanding the recreational programs at this site. Frequent flooding of the site results in extra field maintenance, an issue the County must consider should the park be expanded.

Plum Creek Park

Plum Creek Park is an eight-acre park located on the western border of Montgomery County along Route 11. Facilities include a baseball/softball diamond, batting cages, dugouts, spectator seating, restrooms, a walking trail, a picnic shelter, communal grills, a playground and parking. The park is used by local residents and, occasionally, by public safety officers for canine training in the evenings. This is one of the few parks with a walking path around the perimeter.

Whitethorne River Park Boat Launch is a 1.5 acre riverfront boat launch near McCoy. Although owned by the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries (DGIF), the County's General Services Department maintains the property. Due to DGIF regulation and preference, there are few if any amenities at the site outside of the grassy area, boat ramp and parking. Because of this, the County has very little control over the site.

Montgomery County Public Schools

MCPR has an longstanding relationship with Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS) to share the use and maintenance of some of the school's athletic facilities. While MCPS owns these properties, MCPR maintains them during its program season (except indoor facilities) and provides portable bathrooms.

These shared facilities would benefit from improved signage that identifies the area as also being maintained by MCPR. This would help elevate the presence of the Department and improve wayfinding for users.

A regular dialogue about the ongoing use of these facilities would be beneficial so that both MCPR and MCPS clearly discuss expectations, assess the previous year and make modifications for the future.

Future Facilities

In the recreation survey, respondents identified three capital projects they would like to see in the community: a sports complex, a community center or gym and an outdoor river park. Feasibility, placement, construction costs and operating costs for these potential facilities would need to be examined individually and are not included in this Master Plan.

Programs, Events and Partnerships

The programs, classes and activities that Montgomery County Parks and Recreation offer are the mainstay of the Department and serve thousands of citizens annually. According to survey results, athletics, outdoor recreation and activities offered at the Frog Pond were the most well-attended programs. User fees from these programs, particularly youth athletics, are a significant source of revenue for the Department.

PROGRAMS

Montgomery County Parks and Recreation offers programs and activities for County residents in the areas of Athletics, Aquatics, Active Adults, Outdoor Recreation and Community Programs. These offerings vary seasonally and are promoted to residents three times a year through printed brochures and the Department's website.

Athletics (Eastern Montgomery, Prices Fork, Auburn)

Montgomery County Parks and Recreation offers youth athletics for pre-K, elementary and middle school age children. The Department focuses on the Auburn, Eastern Montgomery and Price's Fork sections of the County and provides the following athletic programs:

- Basketball
- Baseball
- Softball
- Football
- Cheerleading
- Fall Baseball/Softball

Tours and Active Adults

Montgomery County Parks and Recreation offers a wide variety of programs and activities for residents 50 years old or older. Some of these programs are offered in partnership with the parks and recreation departments in Blacksburg and Christiansburg, and some take place outside the region.

Aquatics

MCPR owns and operates the Frog Pond swimming pool, an outdoor pool facility located at Mid-County Park between the towns of Christiansburg and Blacksburg. The pool is open from Memorial Day until Labor Day.

In addition to general pool access, the Frog Pond offers the following programs:

- *Swimming Lessons*: Swimming lessons are offered when the Frog Pond is open during the summer months. Dates, times and prices vary each summer. All lessons are Red Cross structured and cater to children 1-8 years old.
- *Frog Hoppers Summer Camp*: This camp allows children grades 1 through 6 to experience education and recreation at the same time. It involves small group learning activities such as arts, crafts, nature activities, hikes, sports and games. The camp is led by counselors and also includes a weekly swim lesson.
- *Pool Parties*: The Frog Pond swimming pool is available on weekend evenings for private party rentals. The pool can accommodate groups from 20-100 people per party.

Community Programs

All of MCPR's community program descriptions can be found in the Department's brochure, which is printed three times a year and varies by season and class availability. These programs offer a diverse schedule of education/recreation-based activities. Program cost to participants ranges from free to \$50 and activities generally fall into one of the following categories:

Outdoor Recreation

Per the FY16 Montgomery County Budget, outdoor recreation programs "provide diverse programming based on adventure, conservation, environmental education and experiential education for a wide selection of the population with a high adventure sports focus. Montgomery

County was one of the first municipal parks and recreation departments to offer outdoor recreation programs for its citizens in southwest Virginia and continues to be a driving force in the municipal parks and recreation outdoor industry" (Montgomery County Budget FY 16, pg. 215). Programs and activities are listed below:

EVENTS

While not usually revenue-generating, most of MCPR's events are coordinated in partnership with other agencies or organizations and typically generate a lot of public interest. MCPR should regularly review its event offerings to ensure the time and money required to plan these events doesn't take away from the more integral programs it offers.

MCPR hosts a number of events each year for Montgomery County citizens. The most popular events are described below:

Courtyard Concert: Co-sponsored by and located at Meadowbrook Library, the Courtyard Concert is held annually in the summer. This free event features a musical guest and ice cream.

Mother's Day Celebration: Co-sponsored by the Montgomery Floyd Regional Library and MCPR, this annual celebration is hosted at the Meadowbrook Library and is an afternoon dedicated to making moms feel honored and loved. The event also features activities and door prizes.

Montgomery County Heritage Day: To benefit the Montgomery Museum, MCPR co-sponsors Heritage Day, an event that highlights the history of the County and increases awareness and understanding of local history and culture.

Parks and Recreation Night: In partnership with Radford University and Virginia Tech athletics and the Salem Red Sox, Montgomery County Parks and Recreation participants are invited out to Parks and Rec Night, which highlights the Parks and Recreation Department and gives recognition to the current recreation league teams.

Rowdy Dawg: An annual mountain bike race which began in 1988, the Rowdy Dawg, held on the bike trails surrounding Pandapas Pond, is famous for its tough and grueling race course and draws racers from all over the east coast. The race offers several difficulty levels and typically draws a large and diverse group of participants.

Sandlot Night: MCPR hosts two Sandlot Nights a year for youth athletics football and cheerleading. During a designated high school football game at both Eastern Montgomery High and Auburn High, all recreation league football players and cheerleaders receive free admission when in uniform and are recognized during halftime.

Summer Movie Series: On select Friday nights throughout the summer, MCPR hosts a series of free family movies shown at the Frog Pond. Concessions are provided by a third-party contractor and movies begin at dusk.

Easter Egg Hunt: Annual Easter Egg hunts are held in the Auburn and Eastern Montgomery areas for children ages 1-12. Over 1,000 eggs are hidden, and children are able to take photographs with the Easter Bunny.

PARTNERSHIPS

MCPR does an excellent job of leveraging resources and creating partnerships that expand the services offered to Montgomery County residents. Many times MCPR relies on these partnerships to provide a program or facility to which the Department otherwise has no access. This is a great no-cost benefit to the Department, but does require an extra level of coordination and leaves the Department without ultimate control.

Aside from the facilities owned by the Department, MCPR partners with Montgomery County Public Schools to provide ballfield or basketball court facilities for its athletics programs at the following locations:

- Auburn Elementary School
- Eastern Montgomery Elementary
- Eastern Montgomery High School

MCPR partners with local universities, Radford University and Virginia Tech, to host events or games for its youth athletic programs. The two universities offer free tickets to select men's and women's basketball games for MCPR participants.

MCPR also partners with both Christiansburg and Blacksburg Parks and Recreation departments in order to better serve the residents of the County. The three departments will occasionally co-sponsor events or programs together.

These partnerships help to expand the offerings of the Department, provide mutual benefits to all parties and strengthen the ties of parks and recreation related entities in the region.

MCPR's volunteer base is integral to their operations. Currently, citizens may volunteer in the roles of youth athletic coaches and referees/umpires for athletic events. Potential volunteers must fill out an application form and before approval, a background check is completed for each volunteer. The Department's Athletic Coordinators keep a running database of past volunteers, which varies seasonally.

Equipment

Athletic and Outdoor Equipment

MCPR maintains a large inventory of equipment for its athletic and outdoor programs. Most of the smaller equipment items are in good repair, but have short useful lives and need to be replaced regularly. Larger items should be replaced on a predetermined schedule, in order to plan for these expenditures within the annual budget.

Vehicles

MCPR owns and operates nine vehicles to support its facilities, programs and maintenance. Many vehicles are purchased used and are in need of repair. Program directors, maintenance leaders and other staff drive these vehicles. Increased use, especially from programs such as the Active Adult and Senior Tours programs, will increase the need for replacement. Participants in the recreation survey identified a desire for a small bus specifically for MCPR use.

Maintenance Equipment

Since MCPR maintains its facilities internally (except turf management, which is maintained by Montgomery County General Services), it is also responsible for the equipment to support the maintenance of these facilities. Most of this equipment such as pressure washers, weed eaters and chainsaws will be maintained and replaced through operating funds from the Department. However, large items, such as the Department’s side-by-side all-terrain vehicle, which is used for trail and field maintenance, will need to be replaced within the next 20 years.



Structure and Operations

The organizational structure of the Department has evolved over time, but the current organizational chart is reflected below. Currently, MCPR has nine full-time equivalent employees, one part-time assistant athletics supervisor and two part-time maintenance employees. Part-time seasonal maintenance employees are employed as needed.

The Parks and Recreation Commission, an 11-member advisory board made up of a representative from each of the seven County districts, two at-large members and liasons from the Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors. The MCPR Commission meets monthly to provide oversight and input to the Department.

The MCPR office is housed in a suite within the Montgomery County Government Center, located at 755 Roanoke Street in the Town of Christiansburg. The Department's offices are open to the public during regular working hours, however, much of the programmatic schedule for Parks and Recreation occurs during evenings and weekends, based on the seasonal nature of its programming.

Outreach and Marketing

MCPR employs several marketing and outreach methods to engage and inform the community about news and updates:

Social Media: MCPR has both a Twitter account and several Facebook pages (General Department, Frog Pond and Athletics) that are updated several times a month. This marketing and outreach method alerts the most technology-savvy users with real-time updates, reminders and links.

Website: The MCPR website is a subsection of the Montgomery County website and is located at www.montgomerycountyva.gov/parks. The site is fairly static and connects users to summary pages of the following programs: athletics, adult and youth education, aquatics, parks and facilities, outdoor activities and active adults. Users are directed to an online version of the Department’s seasonal brochure and links to various registration and reservation forms. The site also displays recent Twitter postings.

Brochures: Brochures are printed three times a year with programs, classes and activities that change seasonally. Hundreds of brochures are printed and placed in well-trafficked locations throughout the County.

Word of Mouth: The relationships MCPR staff have cultivated with parks and recreation users are a vital outreach and marketing method for the Department. Many of the programs MCPR offers are promoted through recommendations from its current users .

Maintenance

MCPR employs two full-time employees and two seasonal employees as its maintenance staff. Maintenance staff is in charge of upkeep for the recreational facilities, parks, restrooms, pool and trails the County owns or operates. This includes maintaining the County portion of the Huckleberry Trail, general trail maintenance, athletic field maintenance and facility repair. The County’s General Services Department handles the mowing for all the grass fields at each park. The maintenance staff has a storage office and uses the two maintenance trucks MCPR owns. The sites that are currently easiest to maintain are Eastern Montgomery Park and McCoy Park. Old Shawsville Elementary School and Mid-County Park require the most maintenance. Overall, the parks and facilities of MCPR are well maintained, however, office space for the maintenance department near Mid-County park is limited and has reached its storage capacity.

Funding

Funding for MCPR has gradually increased over the last 10 years, but has remained two percent of the overall County budget. Currently the Department generates 17% of its budget in program revenue; the Town of Christiansburg and the Town of Blacksburg Parks and Recreation departments generate 22.9 percent and 33.5 percent in program revenue respectively. Parks and recreation departments have also incorporated grantmaking as an additional source of revenue.

Chapter 5: Implementation

In order to accomplish these recommendations within the next 20 years, three areas need to be addressed:

1. measurements of success,
2. funding, and
3. structural changes

Measurements of success will be addressed through a list of benchmarks for each recommendation. Benchmarks are indicators as to whether a recommendation has succeeded or is completed. These benchmarks will highlight key participants, a general cost based on 2015 dollars and the timeframe for completion. MCPR staff, County administration, the MCPR Commission and the Board of Supervisors can use these benchmarks to measure the performance of the Department over time. Funding will be addressed on page 56. Structural changes will need to be made at the discretion of the MCPR Department Director, Montgomery County Administration, and the Board of Supervisors as the County prioritizes further program development and future capital improvements.

Funding

When implementing almost any plan, funding plays a large role in which strategies are feasible to complete. Successful implementation of this Master Plan will require the Department to seek all available revenue sources and partnership opportunities. In addition to the General Funds and user fees that currently comprise Montgomery County Parks and Recreation's annual budget, there are other sources of funds available for parks and recreation, with grant funding being a source MCPR is not currently taking advantage of.

Several potential grant funding sources are listed below, and MCPR should continue to research other options as well.

EPA Brownfield Grants: The Environmental Protection Agency offers two grants that could benefit the site of the former baseball fields at Mid-County Park. First a Brownfields Assessment Grant, which provides funds to inventory, characterize, assess and conduct planning (including cleanup planning) and community involvement related to brownfield sites; and secondly, a Brownfields Cleanup Grant, which provides funds to conduct the actual cleanup of the brownfield site. The Montgomery County Code of Ordinances provides the County the right or special use of lands for recreational purposes within districts and overlays. Some zoning districts and overlays require an open space element. The County is also approached regularly with land donations, yet has no criteria for determining which lands would be best suited for parks and recreational uses.

The six standards of evaluation below will allow the County to objectively evaluate current facilities, future purchases and potential land donations to the County for either passive or active recreational purposes. Appendix F includes score sheets for both types, and further defines the criteria supporting these standards.

Montgomery County Recreation Survey Summary

11 November 2015

The Montgomery County Community Recreation Survey was held from August through October 2015, and included online and in person surveys. New River Valley Regional Commission (NRVRC) staff developed the survey based on feedback from Montgomery County Parks and Recreation (MCPR) staff, the MCPR Commission, and County administration. NRVRC and MCPR staff administered the survey in person at sports and athletic events, along with other community events during this time period. Signs were created and distributed throughout the County advertising the survey, and were placed in public spaces, retail centers, schools, and on County property. The survey was distributed online through the County's website, emailed to participants on the MCPR listserv, and posted on social media.

Ending in October, the survey was open for 87 days, with a total of 358 surveys collected. 220 surveys were taken online, and 138 were taken in person for an average of over 4 surveys per day. Response rate varied per question. With 94,412 persons living in Montgomery County, according to the 2010 census, the margin of error for this survey is $\pm 5.17\%$, with a 95% confidence level. See attachment for more details.


The survey was broken down into seven sections: athletic facilities, parks and recreational facilities, programs, events, capital improvements, outreach, and background information, for a total of 30 questions.

Some clarification should be noted:

- In the online survey, if a question was answered in the negative ("YES/NO" answered questions), then the follow up questions pertaining to the original question were not asked of the survey taker. Those who took the survey in person tended to answer more questions, because the survey did not instruct them to skip those that did not pertain to them.
- In Question 15, the option "Courtyard Concert" only appeared in the written survey. This was not by design, but was omitted from the online survey in error. This means that there were no responses selecting "Courtyard Concert" from the online survey.
- In both the online and written survey, it was requested of the survey taker to only select one amenity. Many survey takers selected more than one. Rather than sifting through and selecting only one amenity for each of these surveys, all selections were counted.
- Question 21 is an optional question that asks for the email address from each respondents. Since this summary report is a public document, the actual results have been omitted in order to preserve respondent privacy.




